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Serving Parish & Town Councils in Kent

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As highlighted in the 9 June Local Government Bulletin and the June KALC CEO Bulletin, the Boundary Commission for England (BCE) has published its initial proposals for new Parliamentary Constituency boundaries. BCE has produced a partner pack and anyone can respond to the consultation **which closes on 2 August**. The proposals include increasing the number of Parliamentary Constituencies in Kent from 17 to 18, with changes to existing boundaries in some areas. We would strongly encourage all member councils to consider the proposal for their Parliamentary Constituency area and to respond directly to the BCE if it has any concerns/issues with the proposals. KALC's long-held position has been to not respond as an

Some might like a proposed change to a particular area, while other member councils might not as they have strong individual links with existing MPs/boundaries. We are encouraging all member councils to consider the proposals and for councils to respond from their own perspective, as the Boundary Commission must take into account the input of electors in reaching an equitable outcome.



How to Book Our Events...

Serving Parish & Town Councils in Kent

> Kent Association of Local Councils uses its website and Eventbrite to announce its events so that delegates can choose the workshop or conference they wish to attend. At the present time, all our events are delivered online via the Zoom video conferencing programme, which we find suits everyone's needs when we cannot deliver traditional face to face venue events. Both Eventbrite and Zoom are easy to use with a few simple pointers.

We will always send out a "flyer" to inform our membership of upcoming events, so look out for them in your inbox.

There will always be a hyperlink for you to click on, which will direct you to our website in the first place.

The date and time will be shown here, with a brief description of the event. Click on the relevant link and that will take you straight to the Eventbrite booking page for the event you would like to join.

We strongly encourage individual Councillors to sign up for an event via the Clerk to the Council. However, when that is not possible, please check with your clerk before booking your own place.

There are two sections that need to be completed. One is the "ticket buyer" - this is the Clerk or Responsible Finance Officer. Invoices are generated automatically from the site, so you should know what is payable to KALC immediately. You should insert the name and contact details of the Clerk/RFO here so they receive our invoice at once. KALC no longer sends out invoices for Training and Events.

The second section refers to the "Attendee". This is for the individual who will be attending the event. It is particularly important that the email address for that person is entered and is correct as this is where all joining instructions will be sent. Do double check the form before you hit the "Send" button.

If all your details are correct, you will receive a notification via Eventbrite (not KALC) one week before and again within 48 hours of the event that informs you of:

The date and time of registration

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What you might need to read beforehand and any links that will provide that information

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The joining instructions - a link to the Zoom account and Meeting ID should that fail.

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We also provide contact details so that if you encounter any issue on the day, we can help you as much as possible.

That should mean that you get the best outcome from attending one of our online courses.

We are always happy to help if you have any problems in booking your place but hope that this guide will help you to book an event at your own leisure.

For events to be insured under the Councils' insurance policy; the Council, a working party or a sub-committee of the Council must be the sole organiser of the event.

We should be advised of any event with more than 1,000 attendees at any one time and the following is a guide to the information we would require:

A full list of activities and who is responsible for them. All Third Parties must have their own Public Liability insurance, for example: catering vans, fair rides, pony rides, bands and stalls that aren't organised by the Council. All Permits and Licenses must be in place and, if required, the Police and Fire Brigade should be notified.

NALC meets with local government minister Luke Hall MP



The National Association of Local Councils (NALC) chair, Cllr Sue Baxter, met with Luke Hall MP, minister for Regional Growth and Local Government at the Ministry of Housing, Communities and Local Government (MHCLG) on 19 May 2021.

Cllr Baxter spoke on and raised issues on several topics, including:

- She expressed her gratitude for his support in getting the Non-Domestic Rating (Public Lavatories) Bill over the line. However, she made it clear that local (parish and town) councils receive their backdated business rate as soon as possible. Mr Hall has written to billing authorities and is keen to understand the broader funding issues.
- She spoke on her disappointment with the government's decision on remote meetings, explained the issues councils were facing and urged the government to act now. Mr Hall defended the government's stance however urged councils to respond to the call for evidence.
- She highlighted the importance of having a practical standards regime and the problems with the current system. She pointed out that it's nearly three months since

Mr Hall said the government would respond to the Committee on Standards in Public Life report.

She welcomed the Queen's Speech tone but stressed proposals to create a stronger, healthier, and more prosperous nation must ensure local councils are empowered. Previous commitments to do this and create new councils would form part of the Levelling Up White Paper. Mr Hall said that there was likely to be a section in the paper on devolution that would include local leadership, new councils and other reforms.

She pressed for the government to invest in building the capacity and capability of local councils, setting out work by NALC and county associations on training and development. Mr Hall was open to this idea and would welcome proposals.

Environment Bill must unleash a million green fingers to create more sustainable communities says NALC



The National Association of Local Councils (NALC) is pushing for changes to the government's Environment Bill to unleash the million green fingers of its movement of 100,000 local councillors to create a greener, more environmentally friendly and sustainable communities.

While NALC has broadly welcomed the bill – which recently completed its stages in the House of Commons and moved to the House of Lords. NALC believes a more communityfriendly piece of new legislation could help England's 10,000 local (parish and town) councils do even more for their communities and the nation in tackling the climate emergency.

Research conducted by NALC as part of its <u>climate change work</u> <u>supporting local councils deliver</u> <u>on their environmental ambitions</u>, shows areas of activity local councils are leading or involved in including

solar panels, reusable energy, plastic-free initiatives, litter picks and clean-ups, electric cars, and charging points, wind farms and tree planting.

Measures being proposed by NALC to improve and strengthen the bill include:

- Ensuring local communities have a strong voice and involvement in Nature Recovery Partnerships and the development of Local Nature Recovery Strategies.
- New powers to enable local councils to protect and plant trees which will help deliver the government's <u>The England</u> <u>Trees Action Plan 2021-24</u>, to promote and operate schemes to re-use and/or up-cycled goods and materials, and to be eligible to use the Localism Act's general power of competence.

• Introducing a new Community Environment Fund aimed at supporting local councils and community groups in unparished areas, along with a new power to provide ministers of the crown to grant fund local councils.

Delivering on the ambitions of the government's communities framework <u>by deeds and their</u> <u>results: strengthening our</u> <u>communities and nation</u> by levelling up local democracy and creating local councils across all of England so communities are not left behind in being able to

take community-led action on climate change because they do not have a local council.



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- Home Office consultation Protect Duty: The Home Office is currently seeking views on how the Protect Duty can make the public safer at publicly accessible locations (see https://www.gov.uk/government/consultations/protect-duty) The deadline for responses is 2 July. One of the proposals is that it will apply to publicly accessible venues holding 100 or more people. The consultation is open to the public and is targeted at: venues; organisations; businesses; local authorities; public authorities; individuals who own or operate at publicly accessible location is defined as any place to which the public or any section of the public has access, on payment or otherwise, as of right or by virtue of express or implied permission.
- Kent County Council consultation HGV Parking. As part of the wider post EU exit transition period plans, DFT granted KCC powers to introduce an Experimental Traffic Regulation Order (ETRO) prohibiting any heavy goods or large goods vehicle which has a gross vehicle weight in excess of 5,000kg (5 tonnes) from parking anywhere within 7 districts and boroughs likely to be most impacted by the traffic management plans. The areas included are Ashford, Canterbury, Dover, Folkestone & Hythe, Maidstone, Swale and Thanet. This came into effect in January 2021. KCC is currently consulting on the ETRO which can be viewed on

Local Voting Rights for EU Citizens Living in the UK



During the UK's membership of the European Union, it was a requirement of membership that EU Citizens living in the UK could both stand and vote in local elections across the UK. These rights were reciprocated to UK citizens living in all EU Member States.

Now that the UK has left the European Union, and Freedom of Movement has ended and a new points based immigration system has been introduced, EU citizens' voting and candidacy rights in local elections need to be updated to reflect our new relationship with the EU.

Voting rights for UK citizens living in EU Member States are now not the same across all countries and some EU Member States have not retained voting rights for our UK citizens living abroad. Each individual EU Member State has the authority to make their own voting agreements with the UK



What are the proposed changes?

• All EU citizens who have been living in the UK since before the end of the Implementation Period, which ended at 2300 on 31 December 2020, will retain their local voting and candidacy rights, provided they retain lawful immigration status. This is in line with the Government's commitment to respecting the rights of EU citizens who chose to make their home in the UK before the end of the Implementation Period.

The local voting and candidacy rights of EU citizens who arrived in the UK after this point will rest on the principle of a mutual grant of rights, through agreements with EU Member States, ensuring we are protecting the rights of British citizens living in EU countries in turn.

These changes will affect the rules in Section 79. In particular councils will have to have regard to these new rules in co-option. No date for the implementation of these new rules has been announced.

Grass, crop and woodland fires can have a devastating impact, injuring or killing wildlife, destroying property and livelihoods, and even putting people's lives at risk.

As we enter peak season for these types of incidents, residents, workers and visitors are being urged to do their bit to reduce the number of accidental grass fires across the county.

Most happen between May and September when grassland can get very dry, and many are caused by out of control bonfires, as well as careless disposal of hot smoking materials, and disposable barbecues.

In a bid to crack down on these largely avoidable types of incidents and make the county safer for everyone, KFRS has launched an accidental grass fire prevention campaign which will educate the public about what they can do to help and stay safe.

These types of fires can have devastating consequences"

Colin King, KFRS' Assistant Director for Customer Engagement and Safety, said: "In 2020 our crews responded to 617 accidental grass fires, many of which were preventable.

"Grass, crop and woodland fires have the potential to take hold and spread rapidly, especially in warmer months when grassland can be very dry – 83% of last year's accidental grass fires happened between May and September.

"These types of incidents can have devastating consequences, therefore it's important that everyone living, visiting and working in the county plays their part in preventing them from happening in the first place – something we hope this campaign will help to achieve."

The campaign will highlight simple things people can do to avoid accidentally starting grass fires, and as a result protect themselves, the local community, property and wildlife. Such as:

• When lighting a bonfire, keep it to a manageable size, make sure it's well clear of greenery and property, and always supervise it while it's burning. Avoid having a bonfire in windy weather.

• Dispose of smoking materials responsibly, making sure they're fully stubbed out and cooled before being put in a bin - consider using a portable ashtray when on the go.

• Place disposable barbecues on a sturdy, non-flammable surface when cooking, away from greenery and property, and only place in a bin once fully cool.

Colin added: "Grass fires often require a large amount of fire service resources and can take hours, days or even weeks in complex cases, to fully extinguish. This campaign is all about working together with the public to drive the number of accidental grass fires down, keeping people safe and freeing up our crews to respond to other, less-preventable emergencies.

"While everyone can play their part in this, it is inevitable that grass fires will still occur and we advise people not to try and tackle grass fires, or any fire, themselves - instead to move to a safe place and call 999. We will always be here to respond when people need us."







Kent Fire and Rescue Service (KFRS) has a message for anyone thinking about starting fires deliberately in the county

'We're watching you'.

In a bid to crackdown on acts of arson across Kent and Medway, the service has joined the national initiative, FireStoppers, inviting local people to join in the anonymous fight against deadly fire setting.

FireStoppers encourages residents to share intelligence

about people they suspect are responsible for incidents of arson, anonymously, 24/7, 365 days a year.

As part of the initiative, areas identified as arson hotspots will be honed in on by KFRS, with signage and targeted social media campaigning used to educate and deter arsonists, or those considering setting fires.

In the last five years, crews have attended 8,988 deliberate fires, involving buildings, vehicles and outdoor areas.

Colin King, Assistant Director for Customer Engagement and Safety, said: "Not only do arsonists put their lives and the lives of others at risk, but they take firefighters away from other emergencies unnecessarily. It's a criminal offence to start a fire deliberately, and we want arsonists to know that the fire service, together with the residents of Kent and Medway, are watching and will report them.

"By joining FireStoppers, we hope members of the public can help us to reduce the number of deliberate fire incidents, by sharing valuable information completely anonymously.

"The reporting service is available both online and over the phone, and is free to use at all times of the day, all-year round.

"Ongoing emergencies should still be reported by calling 999."

It's a criminal offence when someone intentionally starts a fire in order to destroy or damage something, whether that's a building, or outdoor areas such as grasslands and woodlands.

Helping to achieve net zero across the County


As members will know, Kent County Council, Medway Council and the 12 District/Borough/City Councils have all declared climate emergencies and are looking at how they can help the county achieve net zero by 2050.

Member Councils also have a key role to play in this important issue, by working closely with their principal authorities to raise awareness of climate change with local residents, local businesses and other local organisations, as well as looking at how the council can reduce its own carbon footprint.

Climate change is one of our priority areas. Our Climate Change Advisory Committee held its inaugural meeting on 9 June to agree its Terms of Reference and to start taking a strategic look at climate change challenges and opportunities for member Councils across the county. The Climate Change Advisory Committee is submitting recommendations to our July Executive Committee on actions that KALC can take to reduce its own carbon footprint. In taking this important agenda forward, we will be working closely with MPs, Kent County Council, Medway Council and the District Councils Climate Change Network.

Alongside this, we are refreshing our climate change webpage this summer to provide a hub of information at national, county and district level. There is also a raft of information on the NALC website. We are working with our Environment Consultant to produce a simple carbon footprint calculator that member councils will be able to use for free to measure their own carbon footprint, which should provide helpful baseline data on which to measure performance going forward. In addition, we are keen to collect case studies as we know some of our member councils are already taking action on helping to tackle climate change in their area. Climate change will be the theme of this year's **KALC AGM** on Saturday 13 November and we are aiming to follow this with a Climate Change Conference in December. Further details will follow later in the year.

Eviction protection extended

for businesses most in need

Businesses that have had to remain closed during the pandemic and are unable to pay rent on their commercial property will continue to be protected from eviction, giving them the breathing space they need and helping to protect jobs, the government announced on 16 June 2021.

• New rules to be established to ringfence COVID-19 commercial rent arrears and guide tenants and landlords to agree repayment plans

• Measures to protect commercial tenants extended until new rules come into force

• Announcement welcomed by the hospitality sector

In order to give places such as nightclubs and other hospitality businesses the help they need to recover from the pandemic, **Communities Secretary Robert** Jenrick has announced that legislation will be introduced in this session to ringfence outstanding unpaid rent that has built up when a business has had to remain closed during the pandemic. Landlords are expected to make allowances for the ringfenced rent arrears from these specific periods of closure due to the pandemic, and share the financial impact with their tenants.

The legislation will help tenants and landlords work together to come to an agreement on how to handle the money owed – this could be done by waiving some of the total amount or agreeing a longer-term repayment plan.

This agreement should be between the tenant and landlord and, if in some cases, an agreement cannot be made, the law will ensure a binding arbitration process will be put in place so that both parties can come to a formal agreement. This will be a legally binding agreement that both parties must adhere to.

In order to ensure landlords are protected, the government is making clear that businesses who are able to pay rent, must do so. Tenants should start paying their rent as soon as restrictions change, and they are given the green light to open.

The Queens Award for Voluntary Service - Time for Nominations

The Queen's Award for Voluntary Service is the highest award given to volunteer groups across the UK. The Award is the MBE for volunteering groups.

Eligibility

Any group of 2 or more people doing volunteering work can be nominated for the award. The majority of the group must be volunteers, and more than half the volunteers must have the right to live in the UK.

To be nominated they should do work that:

• provides a service and meets a need for people living in the local community

• is supported, recognised and respected by the local community and the people who benefit from it

is run locally

If your organisation is volunteer led and you are looking to significantly raise the profile of your organisation amongst the most influential people in the county including key funders, the Kent Community Foundation is running a webinar on the subject on <u>Friday 9th July at 1pm.</u>
